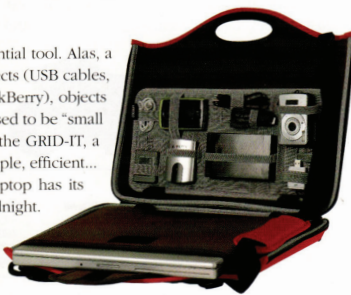


**The CLB551 Laptop Case by Cocoon Innovations
